A spectacular Cork hosting

Ból Chumann na hÉireann - consolidates the European Championships with magnificent organisational feat.

A colourful and sporting pageant extending over four days from 1 - 4 May 2008 marked the staging of the 13th European Bowling Championships in Cork city and county which resulted in spectacular success for Irish road bowlers.

It was only the fourth time in the 40 year history of international bowling for the European Championships to be held in Ireland with previous home events in the city and county of Cork being held in 1970, 1977, and 1992. With the event due to rotate around the participating countries it will be 2028 before the European Championships again return to Ireland.



The parade of nations took place on the opening day through Cork city centre with Armagh player and former Irish women's champion road bowler Dervla Toal having the privilege of carrying the national flag at the head of the parade. Acclaimed as one of the largest and most colourful seen in the southern capital for some time, the parade culminated in the official opening of the



2008 games at a specially erected platform in front of the City Hall. The huge gathering of international players, officials, and sporting enthusiasts were welcomed by Susan Greene, Chairperson of Bol Chumann na hÉireann, who subsequently declared the European Championships open after the attendance had been duly addressed by John Treacy, Chief Executive, Irish Sports Council; His Grace, Bishop of Cork and Ross, Dr. John Buckley; Bernard Allen, TD., former Minister for Sport and Road Bowling aficionado; and the leaders of each of the participating associations: Jan Dirk Vogts, (FKV Germany), Chairman of International Bowl-playing Association; Ernst Hinrich Reimers (VSHB Germany); Maurizio Della Costanz (ABIS Italy); Alloys Timmerhuis (NKB Holland); and Susan Greene (BCE Ireland).

The following three days of competitive sport each saw almost twelve hours of continuous bowling involving 345 players who had qualified for inclusion in the international team selections. They were striving for personal and team honours in the three distinct disciplines that comprise the European Bowling Championships.

The five associations competing for international honours were Nederlandse Klootschieters Bond (NKB Holland); Verband Schleswig-Holsteinisher Bobler (VSHB Germany); Associazione Boccetta Italiana su Strada (ABIS Italy); Friesischer Klootsschiefser Verband (FKV Germany); and Ból Chumann na hÉireann (BCE Ireland).














The three bowling disciplines which comprise the European Championships are:-

- Dutch Moors Bowling, using a nederlandse veldkloot with a diameter of 65mm and weighing 300 grams with each player having ten shots over a 2000 metre long specially prepared and perfectly straight grass track.
- Bowl with a diameter of 58mm and weighing 475grms (women and junior competitors loft a bowl with 55mm diameter and weighing 375grms) with the landing spot of three shots from the same delivery point determining the total distance.
- Road Bowling, using the Irish steel bowl with a diameter 58mm and weighing 794grms. with each contestant taking 10 shots over the selected course of normal roadway.

The 13th European Bowling Championships in Cork, Ireland, in 2008 can justifiably claim to have been the most successful to date. It is truly remarkable that a national sporting organisation of such relatively modest proportions, representing disseminated geographical areas of traditional interest throughout Ireland, and sustained mainly through the unstinting efforts of its voluntary officials, could stage with such proficiency and ultimate success, the magnificent sporting showpiece that was the 13th European Bowling Championships.

To have done so with minimal public funding and in the absence of any major sponsorship deal is a magnificent tribute to the dedication and enthusiasm of the organisation's leaders and the genuine support base that comprises every level of interest and activity within the entire structure of Ból Chumann na hÉireann.

The enhanced media exposure that is generated through such a spectacular bowling event is just one of the bonus elements emanating from this international series and whilst the traditional bowl player is well acquainted with pursuing their sporting interest for the mere love of the game, it remains a perplexing conundrum that fair and adequate public funding is not more often realised for the staging of such a celebrated event as the European Bowling Championships.





























Keeping the ball rolling

The beautiful game explained by Eamonn Sweeney (Sunday Independent 11 May 2008)



Most people who've driven the roads of rural Cork will have encountered a large group of pedestrians who either shove in to the side of the road or caution you to wait for a second while the next shot is played.

These men, and an odd woman too, are part of the road bowling fraternity, following a game whose object is to cover a course of a couple of miles or so in the lowest possible number of throws of a steel ball. The reaction of most motorists is to feel good that something so uniquely Irish is being preserved in Cork and, at the other end of the country, Armagh.

Because bowling is uniquely Irish, right? If I tell you that this day last week a bowler called Tim Pat O'Donovan was competing on the road between Bandon and Dunmanway, you'd expect that. But you wouldn't expect his opponents to have been Loris Fiorelli, Coen Kuipers, Uwe Stademann and Henning Feyen. Welcome to the European bowling championships.

Flor's Article

It all began in 1967 when Flor Crowley, a national school teacher in Dunmanway and founding Chairman of Ból Chumann na hÉireann (1954-1980), sent an article on the sport to an American magazine. A young Dutchman happened to see the article and was struck by the fact that a similar game was played in his native area, near the German border. When he brought the news home, the Dutch bowlers made contact with their Irish counterparts who visited Holland to take part in a score.

This international encounter caught the attention of the bowlers of two German regions, Ostfriesland on the Dutch border and Schleswig-Holstein, between the North and Baltic seas. The games played by the three countries involved were not identical but they had enough in common for a first European Championships to be held in 1969.

They have been held every four years since and these days the Italian bowlers, from Pessaro on the Adriatic coast, have joined the fray. Once the bowl starts rolling, it has a tendency to gather momentum.

German Lofting

The championships take place over three days, getting under way with the German Loft. This is the specialty of the German teams, particularly the mighty FKV which of course stands for Friesischer Klootschiefer Verband.

These Ostfrieslanders are a tall, powerful bunch whose top bowlers resemble decathletes and they have dominated the championships in recent years, largely because there are 42,000 players in the region, around ten times more than any of the opposition.

At the Nemo Rangers sports complex, they fly off the edge of the small platform which they use and propel the projectile well over 200 feet. As the FKV juggernaut pulverises all opposition, their fans chant, 'Hurrah, hurrah, das FKV ist ja'. The first Irish competitor finishes 19th.













Among the FKV stars is the legendary Hans Georg Bohlken, a revered figure in Irish bowling for his feat in lofting a bowl over the Chetwynd Railway Viaduct just outside Cork city. A champion as far back as 1984, Bohlken leads all the way with a total of 241 metres for three throws before he is overhauled at the death by his team-mates Frank Goldenstien and Thore Frollje. The FKV look invincible.

Dutch Moors

Half-way through the Dutch Moors competition, which takes place on a 2,000-metre long straight grass track at Rathcoole airfield between Millstreet and Mallow, it becomes clear that a mighty struggle is going on between BCE (Ból Chumann na hÉireann) and the FKV for team gold. And as news starts coming up the course that the Irish are up in three, down in three and level in another two, it's a bit like the Ryder Cup.

It's a dirty day at the airfield and by the time the competitors are on their final stretch, the going is sticky and the windy conditions increasingly arduous. Unfazed by the team tussle between the Irish and the Ostfrieslanders, the Dutch look set for a one-two in the individual competition, Marc Oude Lutkhuis and Robert Meijer leading with just one pair left out on the course.

The pair in question are reigning champion Dirk Taddings of the FKV and Ireland's Philip O'Donovan and the thickening mud lends a primordial air to a truly epic struggle.

Because, in a competition of 500 bowls, it all hangs on the final two. Taddings has looked slightly the stronger all the way up but O'Donovan takes the lead with his second last shot and holds his nerve to win.

The 36-year-old winner from Churchtown South near Cloyne has been bowling since he was eight years old.

"I won the All-Ireland Junior B in 1993 and the Junior A in 1994. In 2000, I won the Munster title and got beaten in the All-Ireland final and in 2005 I won the Munster and All-Ireland titles."

It is an exemplary tale of progression, all those previous championship winning bowls meaning that when O'Donovan has a shot to



win his first European title, he keeps his nerve and sends the Irish into raptures. They win the team title too and there is a sense of a tide turning.

How It Works

Flor Crowley once described the great Dutch bowler Martin Seifkin as having "the strength of a lion and the style of a Corkman." It's important this style element. There is far more to bowling than simply heaving the bowl up the road.

Witness what happens every time a player faces up to a shot. There are several observations from his followers that he is taking the wrong angle and suggestions that he send the bowl along a different route to what he appears to be considering. One man'shows' for the bowler by standing on the road at the point where he reckons the bowl should pitch. Sometimes this point is marked by a 'sop', a lump of grass placed on the road. When a score is over, the sops lie along the course, like the spoor of some mysterious green beast. The best bowlers read and utilise the turn and camber of the road like a great golfer reading the breaks of the green.

Yet Irish belief in the superiority of their style has taken a battering for the last couple of decades. Not since 1988 has an Irishman or the Irish team won the road title. At the last championships, in Ostfriesland, the FKV filled the first seven places on the road.

Pride has been shaken. BCE treasurer James O'Driscoll tells me that the Irish team have















bowled the championship course 11 times in recent weeks, getting up at dawn to avoid the early morning traffic. All is set for a showdown on the R586.

Kelly's Heroines

Realistically, the Irish women shouldn't have a chance against the women of the FKV. There are thousands of female bowlers in Germany and the FKV have held months of eliminatory contests to find a team. The relatively small numbers of women playing the game here means there was no necessity for BCE to do anything similar.

Yet the Irish women set Day Three going with a clean sweep of the medal positions. A small blonde 18-year-old, Kelly Mallon, from Madden just outside Armagh City, takes the gold just metres ahead of Catriona O'Farrell Kidney, member of a well known East Cork hurling family, (brother Sean was a talented forward for the county senior team in the late 1990s.)

Mallon's success is a fillip for the Northern members of the Irish bowling family. Fiercely competitive on the road, she is engagingly shy afterwards. It's left to her grandfather Seamus to tell me that the Mallon house is on the bowling road in Madden. "We call the game 'bullets' in Armagh," he says.

This is O'Farrell Kidney's second silver medal in two days but she is unabashed and as the men's competition heats up, can be seen dashing up and down the road, sharing every shot with her team-mates. That they are a minority renders the bowling women no less dedicated.

The Champion

If the Moors competition was like the Ryder Cup, the road bowling reminds me of the Tour De France as several thousand fans line the road, the mounting cheers from back the road telling of home triumph. The bowl itself is in the position of the cyclist in the Pyrenees as

















inquisitive spectators gather in its path before pulling expertly aside to let it through.

It's clear from early on that the Irish have regained the upper hand for the first time in two decades. At the end of the day, they will fill the first nine places. Yet the overall winner will be a surprise to most of the supporters.

David Murphy points at a bush a couple of hundred metres back: "All the time we trained on this road, I never bowled beyond that." We are standing beyond the magical 2,000metre mark which a few of the Irish team were rumoured to have surpassed with their ten shots in the previous few weeks. Yet this 24-year-old carpenter from Brinny, near Alice Taylor's home village of Innishannon, wasn't one of them.

When Murphy bowls, there is a rare intensity about him. It is as though he is putting all his personality into his shots, as if there is some integral quality within himself he wishes to express by his efforts. His seventh, eighth and ninth shots drew gasps from the crowd. "I've never seen three bowls in a row as good," one man says to me.

The Murphy's are a bowling family. David's father and uncle were senior players and his younger brother Aidan is also on the Irish team. When I ask him how often he bowls, he says, "two or three times a week training. But we carry a bowl in the car with us and any time we see a good stretch of road we get out and bowl on it."

No-one else gets over the magic mark. Young Murphy is the champion in the big one.

And the point of It all is

The Italians have struggled all weekend. They are relative newcomers and are further hampered by the fact that the Pesarans seem to generally be small people. Yet they have cheered their team's shots to the echo from the beginning and on Sunday afternoon the shouts of "bravo" still resound along the road.

And when Francesco Boiani concludes his score with a shot that gives him an excellent 17th place out of 50, the crowd break into spontaneous warm applause.

"It is so good to have them here," says a towering German at my elbow. This is the spirit of bowling and it is a remarkable thing.

We hear a lot of stuff about European integration and most of the time its proponents seem to be positing some kind of homogenized vanilla entity where national differences have been ironed out. Yet I've never seen the concept so perfectly epitomised as it was over those three days in Cork when the four countries involved showed that integration is all about cherishing both what is distinct as well as what we have in common.

Ever since the Dutchman happened across the magazine article, Europe's bowlers have been creating and cementing friendships. They are remarkable people who play a remarkable sport. The amount of voluntary effort put in last week was truly humbling.

And as one old timer said to me: "You see people walking to get fit and going nowhere. Wouldn't they be better off bringing a bowl with them and having a score while they're at it?"

He might have a point.




















Winners

Three days of drama, emotion, fun and friendship that won't be forgotten.

As a 'blow in' from Scotland, never did I dream of being involved with the best roadbowlers in Europe.

Although standing on the Bandon Road at 6.00am on a January morning, to prepare for the European Championships in May should have told me something.

As I watched players arrive from all over Munster, some raring to go, others not too sure about this 'training' malarkey,

Finbarr, James & Dan setting out the signs and preparing to listen to the grief of all drivers diverted to allow us to train.

It confirmed the passion, dedication, and will to win that everyone involved had.

With qualifying completed on the Lee fields in



November for the Moors and Lofting, the Road training, and later the trials, would guarantee the players on form would be selected to compete.

We had over 20 training & trial sessions to prepare a team, players turned out in numbers, and hopefully outside of the championships, the players all gained something for themselves that helps them become better players, by preparing or training better.

The results show that the players selected performed to their best and more, but the players who missed the cut must be remembered, as they gave as much if not more in the success, and with the final selections all being so close, any would have stepped in and competed successfully.

Day 1, the Lofting, we met our competitors face to face. Talk of exceptional players amongst other teams spread like wildfire. We















were up against it, but if the measuring had been treated differently there would have been several medals, but maybe it was just as well, as in hindsight it would have been a bit embarrassing to win too many altogether.

Day 2, the Moors, on a windy damp day in Rathcoole, the day didn't do the brilliantly prepared track justice, but the track certainly looked after us. Many great performances, but little in this world could beat the excitement and thrill of watching Phillip O'Donovan bowl the winner after every Irish player had set the target before him.

For me, that last bowl was the image of the weekend for me, the crowd, the tension, the excitement, then the roar of the crowd as a truly great sporting moment is created. As for the medal presentation, flags flying, lorry's rocking and Eamonn Bowen Jnr, nothing can match it.

Day 3, Roadbowling, and the challenge to win back the pride of the Irish in winning their own event, the thought of losing on home ground drove everyone on. But no one, not even the most optimistic could have foretold who well everyone played.

Every player prepared as they should have, gave support and encouragement to each other, and the results showed what can be achieved when this happens, truly outstanding results that may never be repeated, and it is a feat that will grow in achievement as years pass.

Being part of an occasion that was the 13th European Championships is a special thing that will bond all players, committee members, organisers, volunteers and supporters.

This was truly a team effort, from meetings in the Munster Arms every week, to painting bowls and making flagpoles, marking roads and cutting grass, and players getting sneaky training in on inchydoney beach, or walking the Bandon Road and hiding bowls in the ditch, everything adds up to being winners.

I was a winner, having the opportunity to be part of a great sporting occasion and victory, and meeting a great group of athletes.



















Keeping it in the family

When we reflect on the Euro2008 championships it is hard not to think about previous championships, events and people who are like links in a long chain. A good starting place might be Cork's St. Patrick's Street on the opening night of the games. I remember being on the streets of Cork in 1992 for that same palpable colour and excitement that was in the air on May 1st 2008. It was the same cacophony of sound. Each of the national groups were loud in their own excitement. And they were excited too to be greeting old and new friends from the various other countries.



Out of all that noise came the friendly call of Jos Leussink. He was seized by pride and joy because two of his triplet daughters—Lindsay and Merlin-were wearing the orange shirts of the Netherlands. Any father would have been proud in such a moment. But for the Leussink family it was even more than pride. Jos Leussink had the distinction of winning the road gold medal at the Jubilee Internationals in honour of the Dutch national governing body the NKB in 1994. Two years earlier, in Cork, his brother Nico won the European road gold medal on the Carrigrohane Road and having been youth champion in 1984. Jos later served as secretary of the IBA. A lot of tradition and a lot of achievement packed into one family. The towering figure of Hans Georg Bohlken was prominent in the German FKV ranks. For Cork bowling people Bohlken is a king. He is the man who conquered the Chetwynd Viaduct with a 28 oz bowl in 1985. That more than his world records and European gold medals endear him to Cork fans. But in the wider bowling world he is a demigod too because of his brilliance. With him is his son, Bernd Georg, who is representing his country for the first time.

On the Irish side we had even more family connections. There are five sets of siblings Aidan and David Murphy; Tim-Pat and Philip O'Donovan: Edmund and Seamus Sexton: Michael and Dervla Toal and Aidan and Lorainne Hurley. There are two father-son connections Mick and Tim Young and John and Cian Shorten. Add to that Kieran Murphy who is a cousin of the other Murphys and Thomas Mackle who is a nephew of the Toals. This bowling world is built on family and tradition. Similar connections linking previous generations of bowlers can be found in the VSHB team and in the Italians, who are taking part in the full range of events for the first time.

Here in the streets of Cork it was like a huge wedding party, familiar faces, relatives and friends gathered to celebrate. Italian, German, Dutch and Irish cousins all related through bowling. The air is festive, but it is also charged with adrenalin. For once the first bowl is lofted at Nemo Rangers the following morning the mood will be one of competition, but in an old fashioned way, it is not just about winning, but winning well and taking ones place among the pantheon of greats. Some, like Bohlken, have already achieved











that goal. Three successive gold medals in the lofting arena 1984 Garding, 1988 Norden and 1992 Cork-followed by three bronze medals, two from 2004 when he also finished third in the Dutch Moors. But there is always more for people like Bohlken. There is the memory of the great Martin Siefken who won seven medals—four successive gold and two bronze medals for lofting and one silver in the Dutch Moors. On the first day of competition Bohlken wins his fourth bronze to join Siefken on seven medals and takes ninth in the Dutch Moors. But he gets perhaps even greater joy when Bernd Georg comes fourth in the youth road event on Sunday in Bandon.

There are no medals for the Leussinks, but they have tasted the air in the heady world that Jos and Nico strode. There is much more to come, Gold medals for Philip O'Donovan (Dutch Moors) and David Murphy (Road) make them the big winners among the Irish siblings. But Michael and Dervla Toal both win bronze road medals and Aidan Hurley wins the youth silver medal. Mick Young wins the father's race with a brilliant silver medal on the road. But others have moved closer to the glorious world of what we might call the hall of famers like Martin Siefken, Seamus Sexton, Bill Daly, Christy Mullins, Hans Georg Bohlken, Stefan Albarus, Antie Schöttler and Gretta Cormican. None more that Catriona O'Farrell- Kidney who won two silver medals, bringing her European total to five — one gold and four silvers to add to her World title. But the VSHB, those friendly people from Schleswig-Holstein leave the games with a new superstar in Ute Uhrbrook (Dreeßen) who won her fourth successive gold medal in the German Lofting. That is the greatest sequence of success in the history of the European championships. And is it not fitting that that honour should reside with an association that gave us great leaders like Karl-Erich Sievers and in recent times those eponymous Europeans like Hans Jacobs, Susan Dirks, Ernst-Hinrich Reimers and Udo Schülke. The Italians leave without medals, but with a host of new friends and the promise of being serious contenders before too long. They may be young in terms of European competition it is only 11 years since we first encountered them in Pesaro. But even then there was an authenticity about their bowling that gave the feeling that they too belong to this far-flung family of bowlers. We look forward with enthusiam to thier hosting of Euro 2012.























A wonderful experience

The VSHB booked the Ramada Golf Resort Hotel in Blarney for 143 of its members as far back as he IBA Conference in autumn 2006. It proved to be an excellent choice, since it was able to accommodate all participants in one centre and it was conveniently located for all competitions and events. The club members as two separate groups on different days, but all of them were able to spend a whole week on the Emerald Isle. It is a general principle of the VSHB to allow ourselves enough time during our trips to Ireland to get to know the country and its people, so that each of the two groups was able to go on a day trip to Dingle and had a further day for themselves.

Apart from some initial difficulties, the competition was excellently organised and extremely enjoyable. The weather was quite cold, but mostly sunny and it only rained during the Moors Bowling. Once again the hospitality if the Irish was exceptional!

Overall the VSHB was guite satisfied with their results in the European Championships. Also we came last in the Road Bowling, we collected more medals than expected in the Moors. In our own particular discipline of German Lofting, however, the results were highly disappointing due to our poor performance in the Men's and Male Youth competitions. In 1992 the Men's results were also so poor that we now wonder if the hard and firm ground of the hurling pitches may be the cause of such little success in Lofting. The VSHB was pleased to see that the medals were spread over all the clubs, in contrast to the competition 4 years ago in Westerstede, when the FKV was completely dominant. The Irish Men' team may have met their Waterloo in Road Bowling at that time, but in Bandon the FKV met its Stalingrad, when Bol Chumann caused a sensation by winning the first nine positions.

For us members of the VSHB the week's stay in Ireland was so enjoyable and unforgettable. 

Road bowling

Ból Chumann's senior men and women performed magnificently at Bandon on that Sunday afternoon of May 4, the final day of the 13th European Championships, as they reclaimed top position in the road bowling discipline. David Murphy and Kelly Mallon are the new European champions bridging gaps of twenty and twenty four years respectively. Their achievements climaxed a wonderful three-day spectacle that brought crowds, colour and superb competition to Cork City, Rathcool and Bandon. The pressure was on the senior men's squad to deliver on this occasion and the response could hardly have been better as, one after the other, they overwhelmed their German, Dutch and Italian counterparts in their respective matches filling the first nine places on the results list. David Murphy had often struggled in the many early morning practice and trial sessions undertaken at the venue and, in the third score out on Sunday, was not going with huge conviction after his opening three. A two hundred and fifty metre fourth off the first curve set up him up for his gold winning charge. Using his power and a higher level of accuracy he rattled up the metres with five brilliant closing shots. His eighth in particular saw him scorch up past the sixteen hundred metre mark and he beat the early leader Tim Pat O'Donovan's total with his next. 2010 was his final tally and it stood the test for the rest of the day. Although it was silver at the end when it might have been gold, Mick Young's barnstorming performance was still one of the great stories of the weekend. The veteran Bantry campaigner gave further vent to the reality that age need not be a barrier to ultimate honours in the bowling game. A member of Ból Chumann teams not only in 1992 but also, almost unbelievably, at the fifth hosting in Cork in 1977, Young literally burned up the course for the first seven at Bandon. His eighth might have been better but he was still within shouting distance of Murphy's formidable mark throwing his tenth. It veered left missing by thirty five metres but there were no complaints from the amiable Bantry man. Michael Toal was tremendous as well. The Armagh man had spent little enough



practise on the road but was smooth strong and fair on the sop in score four as he closed on Murphy's total. His ninth undid his challenge for gold but his 1,969 metre total was good enough for individual bronze. Patrick O'Driscoll, Aidan Murphy, Eddie Carr, Tim Pat O'Donovan, Bill Daly and Philip O'Donovan took the next six places before Bastiann Zwiers of NKB Holland with 1,744 took tenth as the leading player from the continent. There was no doubting Bol Chumann's winning the team gold honour. Mark McManus as team coach played a big part as did Christy Mullins and Bill Daly as managers of the senior selections, Within an hour came the final presentation of medals and the closing of the 13th European Championships. The Irish celebrated a marvellous success and a regaining of prestige lost on the road at Westerstede in 2004 when FKV took the top seven places on the results list. They received the congratulations of the vanquished and a promise of renewed battle in two years time when the NKB Dutch association host a World Road Bowling championship in 2010. Following that will be the next big gathering for the 14th European Championships at Pessaro, Italy, in 2012. The host Association received many plaudits for the organisational efforts that ensured the











smooth running of the previous days. Susan Green declared the championships closed and passed the mantle for the 2012 games to Maurizio Della Costanza, president of ABIS, Italy. Mr Della Costanza promised the visiting associations that the event in four years time would match what he had seen in Ireland on the previous three days.

A top three for the home team in senior women road bowling was not foreseen. Not since Gretta Hegarty in the inaugural women's championships in Garding in '84 had Ból Chumann won individual gold at this event. The extraordinary career of Kelly Mallon reached a new pinnacle when her 1,459 metres gave her European gold by just seven metres from Catriona O'Farrell/Kidney on a day when five of the six Irish competitors in the thirty strong field made it into the top ten. The All-Ireland senior and U18 champion was a model of consistency throughout averaging close to 150 metres with every shot. O'Farrell/ Kidney, superb in the Moors on Saturday, showed wonderful character with a courageous display again. A poor seventh derailed her hopes but two mighty efforts, her ninth and tenth, almost made it to gold. Two silver medals from the weekend brings her total medal haul from European championships since 2000 to five. Dervla Toal set the early pace with 1,436 and that was good enough for bronze. Emma Fitzpatrick was a creditable sixth on 1,308, Louise Daly eighth on 1,272 and Louise Collins twentieth on 1,030. They all contributed handsomely to Bol Chumann's top standing in the team stakes.

The most galling miss for gold of the weekend is surely down to Aidan Hurley in the U18 youths road event on Sunday forenoon. It was a hugely exciting competition with less than twenty metres separating the top four. First out was Arthur McDonagh who won his match handsomely from his continental rivals setting a fine target of 1,673. Next on for Ból Chumann was Kieran Murphy who carded 1,477 good for seventh place at the end but leading this group was one Bernd Georg Bohlken, son of the legendary Hans of the FKV German team. He came desperately close to McDonagh with 1,661.7. Then came match 3 where Jann Galts of FKV clocked up the metres. He outgunned Thomas Mackle (Ból Chumann), before delivering a sensational last shot that ran and ran on the high left side as it



rolled past McDonagh's mark by three metres to grab the lead. In score four Aidan Hurley was in magnificent form. With three to go he had Galts in his sights but lost a lot of ground when his eighth caught the right hand grass. To his credit he recovered with a ferocious ninth shot that covered over 230 metres. He now had the gold in his grasp looking at the German's mark less than a hundred metres away. To his consternation he dropped his attempt too close to his body and it cracked right from the off. It came close enough for second place but fell short of Galts by an agonising two metres. Ból Chumann duly won the team event here also.

Any nomination for athlete of the weekend would surely go to the versatile Dutch six-footer, Silke Tulk. In the under age girls category she took two gold medals and a bronze from the 13th European

















Championships. Brilliant in the Moors on Saturday, she was simply unbeatable on the road on Sunday. Her final tally of 1,454 was just four short of Kelly Mallon's figure in senior women and 145 ahead of her nearest challenger in U18. FKV's Kathrin Blum, Fenja Frerichs and Anke Klopper were next in front of the fifth placed Jane O'Neill. The Armagh girl had a poor start hitting the barrier and, although playing well thereafter, did not have the power to overcome the deficit. Lorraine Hurley was seventh and Karena Hunter twelfth giving Ireland bronze in the team category.

The early morning mist and sporadic rain later made it a damp day at Rathcool, Mallow on Saturday but it didn't detract one whit from a marvellous days sport. A glorious gold medal for Philip O'Donovan in the senior men's competition crowned the occasion following the exploits of Killian Kingston and Catriona O'Farrell/Kidney earlier who won silver in their categories. O'Donovan's duel with 2004 champion Dirk Taddings (FKV) in the final match of the day was a thrilling affair. Indeed all ten senior matches were exciting as the competitors battled the well-prepared but slippery track. Eamon Bowen (Jun), a positive and rousing influence in terms of team spirit throughout the weekend, had the chance of an early lead with his 840 metres, David Murphy won his match with 844 later and Edmund Sexton took the lead with a fine tally of 864. The men who have done more than most to put Ireland on the international

bowling stage, Bill Daly and Christy Mullins were outstanding on Saturday carding 867 and 871 but were both headed by the Dutchmen, Mark Oude Lutkhuis and 2000 champion, Robert Meijer on 876 and 890. And so it came to the final showdown. Through the mud came O'Donovan and Taddings neck and neck, the lead changing with each shot and scoring well with throw after throw. O'Donovan grabbed a vital lead with two to go and held his nerve in the mounting pressure to bring a wonderful first gold of the games for the host country. The scenes of joy were unbridled after that success and continued on the podium despite the pelting rain late on Saturday evening. Ireland won the team event by 500 metres from FKV.

Christina Damken (FKV) is the new force in women's Moors bowling. She followed up her U18 gold at Westerstede by taking first place in senior on Saturday last with a terrific 655 metres in difficult conditions. Bearing down all the while was 2004 winner Catriona O'Farrell but a great display finished eleven metres short of gold. Sandra Schimanski (FKV) was third on 633. Gretta Cormican, in her seventh European Championships, showed the innate competitiveness that has stood her in good stead for so many years was next best of the Irish at twelfth with 569. Marie Noonan eighteenth, Louise Collins twenty first, Aisling White twenty third, and Susan Cullen twenty fifth filled the remaining Irish places resulting in bronze for the team prize. East Cork's











Killian Kingston had showed real potential in the Moors trials and he produced it on the day with a superb 860, a total that had him leading for most of the morning. The lofting expertise of Stefan Runge (FKV) (silver at Nemo on Friday) was to be a big factor in Kingston's losing out for the top spot. Runge was in the last match out and ate up the metres with sixty metres casts to eventually overhaul the East Cork youth by thirty seven metres. Hendrik Rudebusch (FKV) was third with 853. Ból Chumann other participants, Christopher Murray, Arthur McDonagh and Paudie Lucey were thirteenth, fourteenth and sixteenth enough for bronze in the team placings. Silke Tulk (NKB) won the girls U18 Moors with 702 from FKV's Anke Klopper and Kathrin Blum in second and third with 673 and 641, Lorraine Hurley seventh with 556, Eilish Murray eleventh (499) and Karena Hunter twelfth (487) wasn't enough to get Bol Chumann into the team places. All three performed well but were at a disadvantage against the sheer physicality of the German and Dutch competitors.

The Nemo Rangers complex at Trabeg was the perfect setting for the German loft discipline of Friday. The German Associations are the masters and filling the minor places was the role of the Irish. Nonetheless it was an interesting showpiece that developed into a two way fight between FKV and VSHB. The stiff headwind cut distances as the great Hans George Bohlken led the way in senior men for much of the day with a combined total of 241 for his three lofts. Youth prevailed at the end as twenty two year old Frank Goldenstien also FKV won the day with 257 and Thore Frollje came second with 255. Behind Bohlken in fourth was the VSHB top man Sonke DreeBen with 240. Best of the Irish was Martin Coppinger 19th with 202. Next was Eamon Bowen (Jun), twenty first with 200, and David Murphy twenty second with 198. Down the list came Christy Mullins (24), Mike Bohane (25), David Hubbard (26), Edmund Sexton (28), John Shorten (29), Seamus Sexton (31) and lan Callanan (32). Good enough to take the bronze in the team prize from the Dutch (NKB). The VSHB got their gold in the loft when Ute Uhrbrook won the senior women with 157 just five ahead of the second placed Annika Noorman (FKV) _ 152 and Andrea Bloom (FKV) 145. Geraldine Daly was tops for Ból Chumann with a very good 108 and fourteenth spot among the thirty competing. Aisling White



(19), Marie Noonan (21), Emma Fitzpatrick (22), Susan Cullen (23) and Gretta Cormican (25) were too far back for bronze in the team prize. Killian Kingston was Ból Chumann's best performer by far in the German loft at U18. A superb 197 earned him seventh in the overall placings less than forty behind the winner Timo Petznik (FKV) on 236. Moors winner, Runge was second with 231 and Daniel Runge also (FKV) on 210 was third. Christopher Murray, Paudie Lucey and Cian Shorten at fourteenth, fifteenth and sixteenth were behind a four man Dutch grouping and so out of the team medals.

The parade of nations through the City on Thursday evening was one of the largest and most colourful seen in the southern capital for some time. Culminating in the official opening at City Hall, it was attended by Chief Executive, Irish Sports Council, John Tracey, Bishop John Buckley, Bernard Allen T.D., President of the International Bowlplaying Association Jan Dirk Vogt's (FKV), leader of (VSHB) Ernst Hinrichs Reimers, Maurizio Della Costanza (ABIS, Italy), Alloys Timmerhuis (NKB, Holland) as well as members of Ból Chumann's executive. Amid bands and fanfare, speeches of welcome and encouragement, Susan Green, chairperson of Ból Chumann, declared the 13th European Bowling Championships open. What followed over the next three days was a truly great coming together of the bowling fraternity of Europe. Twelve hour days of competition and presentation ceremonies left little enough time for the social niceties that go hand in hand with events such as this. For Ból Chumann the organisational effort was huge. That it was such an outstanding success is a lasting testimony to the drive and determination of a committed team. Susan Green and James O'Driscoll cajoled, harangued and pestered but, most importantly, united all strands of the Association in a wholehearted















effort. The Bandon road on Sunday presented a big logistical undertaking from transferring and erecting equipment used in Rathcool on the previous day to the smooth and safe running of twenty three scores each with five competitors. The sight of several hundred club members from all corners of the county arriving on the road from seven o'clock onwards, ready and willing to give of their time, was a positive indicator that this was going off without a hitch. Referees, markers, stewards and scorekeepers all played their part in momentous weekend for bowling and Ból Chumann. Satisfaction there was too for that tight knit group who, on some days, did the morning afternoon and night shift in the lead up to the championships. The energy and dedication of Susan Green and James O'Driscoll was reciprocated by many not least by their own family members. Gretta Cormican in her role as secretary of the IBA had to pull the strings among the five competing associations. Finbarr Aldworth, Dan McCarthy and Geraldine Daly were ever present to tie the knots together. For all concerned it was a rewarding experience. None had been involved to any great extent in the 1992 championships and as James O'Driscoll repeatedly stated, with Ireland not due to host again until 2028, it was a once off for the present membership to give it their best shot. That they certainly did.

The feel good factor emanating from the successful hosting of the 13th European Bowling Championships was felt throughout the Association. There were many praiseworthy contributions, most notably from the

competing nations, but also from the general public who turned out in such huge numbers to observe the events. For the current administration an important milestone had been passed and the congratulations and acclaim for the wholehearted effort via word, text and email were acknowledged. The most satisfying aspect was, undoubtedly, the performances of the senior men and women teams and for this the plaudits went to Mark McManus and the team managers who so capably guided and brought the best out of a talented selection who were purposely united in their goal. Their achievements will stand the test of time and it was gratifying that so much early morning effort and attention to detail should be rewarded with such an excellent return. Bol Chumann's James O'Driscoll expressed his sincere gratitude to everybody who put their shoulder to the wheel in a huge coordinated effort. Support came from everywhere, from the local authorities, Garda Siochana, the residents in the vicinity of the events in North and West Cork and from countless other sources. The good will shown to the sport from every sector was warmly appreciated. A proposal, by Derry Blake, chairman North East, at the following week's Executive meeting, that the meeting record the outstanding leadership role played by those currently at the helm of the Association was greeted by a sustained round of applause. The event leaves memories that will last a lifetime and, with a World event in Holland in 2010 and the fourteenth European Championships in Italy in 2012, the international aspect of the sport of bowling continues to prosper.



























But for me there was one participant who stood out above all others and that was Silke Tulk from Holland. Silke swept the boards in the U18 category and the potential she put on show last May was awesome. She is going to cause some ripples when she joins the adult ranks. By the look of things she won't have long to wait.

I am certain that the 2012 hosts from ABIS will have studied the event from an organisational

point of view. They will certainly hope to emulate the Irish event and we all look forward to renewing European rivalry on the banks of the Adriatic in 3 years time.


